

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


➤ TaSCS — non-inferiority trial









for Mental Health

Lower out-ofpocket costs Health system efficiency

Better access

Consistent care

Decreased restraint





- Outcomes
 - clinical indicators
 - Functioning
 - stigma
 - quality and safety of care





Ethical issues ...

Included people who lacked decisional capacity to consent

Equity vs autonomy

Application to the real world setting





Ethical issues ...

- Concern for wellbeing
 - Procedures to safeguard a person
- 1. Decisional capacity assessed by psychiatric nurses
- When a person was unable to consent permission was sought from their caregiver
- 3. Planned to formally reassess capacity in between and at each trial time-point.





Ethical issues ...

4. Out-patient mental health care

exposure to coercive care beyond the existing risk unlikely

5. Potential risk of receiving inferior care

- > DSMB
- > Information sheet
- Supervision by psychiatric nurses

6. Advance directive





Recommendations

Capacity to consent should be assessed well

Regular examination of decisional capacity

- Identify caregivers who are best
- Involve people with MHCs on research advisory boards
